What do the Governors do?

Our Governing Board consists of volunteers drawn from the school, church and wider communities. We meet each term to discuss a wide range of school issues, offering a range of skills and experience to give a wider perspective when making decisions for the school.

Our role is strategic rather than operational. This means we guide and influence the direction and development of the school rather than being involved in the day-to-day management.

Our discussion can be broad ranging but as Governors of the school we have 3 core responsibilities:



Governors ensure clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction. The governing body helps to set long-terms plans for the school, decide where improvements need to be made and how to make them.



Governors hold the headteacher to account for the educational performance of the school and the effective and efficient performance management of staff. The governing body looks at the quality of education being offered and ensures the head is doing everything possible to improve results. Reviewing and monitoring the school development plan as it evolves with the needs of the children.

Governors oversee the financial performance of the school and make sure its money is well spent. Governors examine budgets and spending proposals to monitor whether the school is getting value for money and ensure the money is spent in the right areas.

In addition, we visit the school meeting staff and pupils to keep in touch with the day to day running of the school and to monitor progress being made. This in turn helps to inform our discussions and decisions at our meetings.

Keeping our options open

During the current academic year as part of our 2-year plan, the Governing Body has been keeping a watchful eye on the Governments planned Education Bill which detailed that all schools should be part of a Multi Academy Trust (MAT) by 2030. We have attended workshops run by the Diocese, we have met with other local schools and we have been researching a number of MAT's that are looking to increase the number of schools they have within our local area.

Very recently the Department for Education has announced that the 2030 target for all schools to be part of a MAT is not being enforced. This announcement will not alter our 2-year plan to research the MAT options available to Chilthorne Domer Church School, as there are other factors to consider outside of the original Education Bill such as the changes in the services provided to the school by the Local Authority and future budget constraints. There is no intention to move to a MAT in the immediate future, but the Governing Body want to ensure that we have done all the necessary research should we reach a point when joining a MAT needs to be considered to ensure continuation of the high standards the school strives to achieve.

What is SIAMS?

You may have heard this abbreviation spoken of or seen on the school website past reports but wondered what is it all about?

SIAMS stands for the 'Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools'.

Together we Love, we Aim High and we Celebrate!

It is an inspection similar to an OFSTED inspection but SIAMS is the system of inspection employed by the National Society, on behalf of the Church of England and Methodist Church, to fulfil their legal obligations under section 48 of the 2005 Education Act.

When the school is inspected, the inspectors make judgements on religious education, collective worship, and pupils' spiritual, moral, social, and cultural (SMSC) education in Church of England and Methodist schools.

These judgements combine to enable an evaluation of how schools, through their theologically rooted Christian vision, are living up to their foundation as Church schools, enabling people (pupils and adults) to flourish. SIAMS judgements are shared with the school community, the National Society, the Diocesan Board of Education (DBE), the church, and the Department for Education.

SIAMS recognises and celebrates the specific contextual diversity of Church schools and their communities.

In this way, SIAMS provides a framework within which individual schools can answer for themselves three important questions:

Who are we? What are we doing here? How, then, shall we live and learn together?

At Chilthorne Domer Church School, the schools vision is:

Together we Love, we Aim High and we Celebrate!

This is further supported by the Governors' vision – 'We will ensure every child is provided with an outstanding education, so that they can flourish into confident young people with a sense of selfworth, which reflects God's love, and believe they (every child) can make a difference in the world.'

The theological root for our vision throughout the school comes from the Bible. The passage well known to many is taken from the New Testament and Saint Pauls First letter to the Church in Corinth.

'Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends.'

1 Corinthians 13. 4-8

Our vision talks less about what love is and more about what love does. Therefore we hope that this kind of love is evident in everything we do as a school and community.
